SAN JACINTO (river): Saint Hyacinth. Pro. San Ha-then-to. (Sp.)

L T A B BRAZOS (river): Brazos de Dios, Arms of God. (Sp.)

SAN BERNARD (river): Saint Bernardo. (Sp.)

COLORADO (river): Red. Literally, colored. (Sp.)

NAVIDAD (river): Nativity. (Sp.)

GONZALES: *(old)* A common Spanish family name.

SAN MARCOS (river): Saint Mark. (Sp.)

T GUADALUPE (river): Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe was a patroness of the early Spanish missionaries.

T CIBOLO: *(from a river)* Buffalo or bull. (Sp.) Cibola, the feminine form. ~~NOTE-~~ The "Seven Cities of Cibola," sometimes "Seven Cities of Gold," were sought by the Coronado expedition in Arizona and New Mexico, 1540-42. *The Coronado expedition, then the brothers in 1540-42 sought primarily the "Seven Cities of Gold" in Arizona.
