Six Books to Reveal Tale of Old Spanish Rule in Southwest.

San Antonio is due to receive national publicity through a series of six books beging written by Gertrude Harris Cook, formerly a local resident and now of Santa Fe, N. M.

"The Saints at the Crossroads," title of the six volumes, will tell the epic tale of the Old Spanish Trail, which led from historic spots to San Antonio, its geographic center. The books will deal with the romance of the history of the Trail, together with stories of the old Spanish towns that stand like bencons along the route.

According to advance reports from the work, "The Saints at the Crossroads" deals extensively with Texas and the Southwest. Around San Antonio the romance of the Trail revolved. It stood at the crossroads of five great historic highways, and the books will show that here the golden age of Spain paraded with its bold explorers and Conquistadores.

The roads which figure largely, leading into San Antonio, in-Old San Antonio road, the clude: or Camino Real; the Chihuahua Trail, bringing rich trade from Mexico; the Overland Trail, which witnessed and bore the westward movement; the later road to Santa Fe, connecting with the Santa Fe Trail from Missouri, and of course, the of course, Old Spanish Trail, the first.
