May 11, 1917.

My dear Stewart:-

Can you get the enclosure over in the Register? It should be of interest to them as I have made a Tour Guide that has a lot of publicity and maps of the South in it--and it has not cost anyone in the South a cent. All paid for by Chambers of Commerce and others out west. At the same time thousands of copies will be distributed free by the organizations supporting the work. The only reason that there is not a page or two of pictures of Mobile in it is that none were furnished for the Old S.T. guide, so none were on hand. Will send them a copy if you will tell who should get it.

While I cannot come to Tallahassee now as this book is just coming from the press and its immediate circulation through the country means much to the good roads movement and summer tourists, still I am with you in thought and action--the evidence of action being the method of publicity I am engaged in.

When you reach Tallahassee remember this. Erectors Garage is just across the street from the Leon hotel. Get \$25.00 from him or find out why not? And if you see W.J. Rice of Crestview ask him for the same amount. Friend Rollo has quit corresponding with me lately so I guess he has lost interest like other Pensacolans.
