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and that this is a just claim.

WHERE THE MONEY HAS GONE.

(No correct balance sheet is possible from the present state of the records. Various audits and analyses have been made, without harmonizing or proving results. The figures relating to the field men are approximately accurate. The period of this statement is Jan.1--Nov.1)

* Funds were sent from the East in January and February to help carry the Headquarters work until the 1922 income from the West should come. The Managing Director was in unorganized and unworked territory, yet he freed the San Antonio office from any of his eastern expenses, and eastern funds therefore belonged to the East. It was justifiable however to advance funds to the San Antonio office, provided in time the moneys were available later for eastern work when western funds came in. But this is another instance of biting the hand that feeds you! The net amount from the East is \$405 53, plus \$150 00 to D.A. Colp, personal funds by H.B.A. following Colp's crisis of distress, and plus \$250 00 to the Gunter Hotel for rent following distress telegram (still due in return to H.B. Ayres--only \$120 00 has been paid from San Antonio funds for rent), and plus \$50 00 paid for letterheads for the office. Total, \$855 53. The personal check to D.A. Colp was straightway entered on the books as OST funds, but the checks to the Gunter Hotel and the printers were not entered. The Managing Director cast his pearls before --- fine gentlemen.

The East, as heretofore stated, paid all eastern expenses, suffered these advances to San Antonio, paid the Washington expenses, stands today with a clean slate and money available for continuing their work.

The Managing Director himself took but \$750 00 in 1921 for services, giving all his time; this that the movement might live thru that hard period. For the year 1922 he has had \$1300 00 for services, and is still unpaid the \$250 00 he advanced to pay rent the office rent, and he has spent \$450 00 since returning to San Antonio seeking the preservation of this project. It is time some decisions were reached.

While the financial assistance was being sent from the East the President, with Colp's co-operation, was having moneys received from western territory deposited in another bank and disbursing it on his signature alone, violating the constitution and by-laws and the authorizations of the duly constituted officials. With the funds in his control, and other manipulations, he and Colp have been free to do the incredible things shown in this report -- and more.

Letters and telegrams were sent to the Managing Director calculated to delay his return to Headquarters. Propaganda was spread about Texas that western territory had been turned over to Johnston and Colp; at the same time merchants who wanted their accounts paid were told to write to the Managing Director, and his address was kindly given.

WHAT ARE THE REMEDIES?
