There are several books about EL DORADO (The Gilded Chief),-that long and romantic search for a golden fairland. The Spaniards sought the Cities of Cold, the Gilded Chief, the Gran Quivira, the Temple of the Sun and other mythical stores of wealth. They did find fabulous riches. The Indians were shrewd in leading the invaders into perilous adventure. The tales of those searches are a part of the ancient Spanish story.
