One of the minor titles of the King of Spain was that of
Lord of Biscay. Biscay had for its device a white ^{raguled} cross,

MEMO

This "Burgundian cross" in the language of heraldry is a
raguled saltire.

Raguly is the notched effect in regular oblique breaks.
Saltire is the X like cross, not the upright cross.
