as its flag device this red raguled cross with slight variation, and without the coat-of-arms at the ends.

One of the minor titles of the King of Spain was that of Lord of Biscay. Biscay had for its device a white cross, raguled, on a red field. Raguly is the trunked or notched effect.

These flags of Ostend and Biscay are shown in the Beaumont collection, 1705. in the Geographic Magazine, October 1917, p 371, with interesting discussion from Beaumont's record.

MEMO

This "Burgundian cross" in the language of heraldry is a raguled saltire.

Rag'uly is the notched effect in regular oblique breaks. Saltire is the X like cross, not the upright cross.
