Methodist Clergyman Succumbs

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Aug. 11.—Bishop John C. Kilgo of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, died at his home here early today after an extended illness which came upon him last spring while he was returning from the Southern Methodist general conference at Hot Springs, Ark.

The veteran Methodist leader who was elected a bishop at Asheville in 1910, was placed on the retired list at the Hot Springs conference because of his age and falling health.

Bishop John Carlisle Kilgo was born in Laurens, S. C., July 22, 1861. He was married to Fannie Turner of Gaffney, S. C. In 1882 he was ordained a minister in the Methodist Episcopal church, south and served various pastorates until 1889 when he was called to Wofford college as professor of philosophy and financial agent. In 1894 he was elected president of Trinity college, Durham, N. C., where he served until 1910 when he was elected bishop of the Methodist church at the conference in Asheville, N. C.
