Dear Sir:

Your valued favor of the 5th inst.,
reached my office during my absence in the country. I
think the matter of the bridge at River Junction is now
being held up owing to the impossibility of getting
structural steel at a reasonable price. I have heard
nothing from the State Highway Commission but realize
it will be very hard to build this bridge until the
material can be obtained at a reasonable price.

The Spanish Trail in Gadsden county is
somewhat cut up owing to the heavy deliveries of tobacco
at this time. The crop of Shade and Sun Grown tobacco is
one of the finest crops ever produced and will represent
over five million pounds. These goods are being hauled
into the city warehouses, of which there is some sixteen
in operation, and the selecting and packing of this crop
will keep several thousand hands busily employed until the
coming May.
