
Dear Reader

The replacement bridges, the first built in 1954 and then the new bridge of today, continue to be bigger and better structures and thus are able to handle increased traffic, which directly impacts our quality of life for the better.

The MDOT staff and I thank not only Mr. Sullivan for his concise yet thorough history, but also the Board of Trustees and Dr. Willis Lott, president of Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College, for the use of its archives and their archivist in making this publication possible.
