San Antonio, Texas, January 17th, 1922

Ayres, New York, which I have not forwarded as it loogked as the it might be a Christmas present and I was somewhat afraid it would get lost being re-addressed and sent on to Alabama. Do you want it?

Have a letter from T. A. Keene, who is now in Tampa, Florida, and has been for several weeks, and was therefore not redponsible for the error made in the Can Opener of December 25th. Said he would give you some good publicity as soon as he returned from Florida.

I have not written my salary check yet and do not anticipate doing so for a few days; in hopes we will get some more money; (We are not broke of course but one never knows when we might need some) but when I do write my check will have three signed ones left. Do you think that will be enough to carry us thru all right until your return? (Trust you will be able to understand what I am trying to say; haven't made myself at all clear, none of my letters are clear for that matter)

Hope you had a successful dinner Saturday night. Suppose we will get a letter from you in a day or two in regard to it.

Mr. Ayres, you remember of course your telling me to send bulletins and history bocklets to the prospects east. Right before you left I understood you to say to hold them up and you would send me data for another bulletin and I could send it all out at the same time. As I have not heard from you in regard to it, I am afraid I must have misunderstood you. Would you please let me know about it, so I can send the bulletins and history bocklets if I am in error. Suppose you think I am dreadfully stupid at times and perhaps you are right. But no one is perfect you know.
