RESOLUTIONS:.....

Concerning Bond Issue for Texas.

WHEREAS, the Legislature of Texas in session in 1919 has passed a joint resolution, and to be submitted to the people for action, providing for an amendment to the Constitution permitting the Legislature, with the consent of the Governor, to pass bond issues for road construction in the State of Texas in a sum not to exceed \$75,000,000.00; and

WHEREAS, this joint resolution does not provide or stipulate how this money shall be spent, and while we are informed that there is a gentlemen's agreement on the part of the members of the Legislature not to appropriate more than ten million dollars of this seventy-five million dollars at any one session of the Legislature; and

WHEREAS, there is no way of knowing whether the gentlemen of the present Legislature will be in the future Legislature or not and such a gentlemen's agreement is not binding unless in the law itself; and

WHEREAS, we believe that unless there is some specification of how this money is to be spent, say, in certain classes of highways, and some provision made for maintenance and some definite and tangible agreement not to pass more than ten million dollars of this seventy-five million dollars at any one session of the Legislature, that the people of Texas will vote down this resolution by an overwhelming majority; and

WHEREAS, we believe this would be a calamity to the State;

Concerning Bond Issue for Texas.

WHEREAS, we believe that unless there is some specification of how this money is to be spent, say, in certain classes of highways, and some provision made for maintenance and some definite and tangible agreement not to pass more than ten million dollars of this seventy-five million dollars at any one session of the Legislature, that the people of Texas will vote down this resolution by an overwhelming majority; and

WHEREAS, we believe this would be a calamity to the State;
