

Mrs. P. J. Friedrichs called attention to the word "federation" in the two resolutions and stated that all interested women of all organizations would have a part in beautifying highways, and asked that the word be eliminated.

Miss Margie Neale of Texas stated that although she was a great admirer of federated women that this would not be confined to federated clubs. Mrs. Banning of Alabama moved the adoption of resolutions by eliminating the word "federated" seconded by Mrs. Thomas of Gulfport and carried.

Mrs. Fred Burton of Galveston, Chairman of planting, gave a splendid address on how palms were planted in that city. Of how 3000 palms were sold at .50 cents each by canvassing the city streets and beautifying four miles of highway by planting these and oleanders.

Mrs. A. A. Anding of Opelousas, La. spoke of the work of organizing the Pershing Highway community Assn. from the Jefferson Highway at Bunkie through Opelousas to the Old Spanish Trail at Lafayette. The women along this route have been asked to pledge themselves to plant trees, flowers and shrubbery, to beautify their yards and the road in front of their farms. To see that all trash and glass is picked up and to keep people from putting up bill boards and signs on trees and fences, and to try to get a camp site about every fifteen miles. The women will use this as a community center, have a storm shed, a house near that will serve as a rest room and shop with 'phone, the name of nearest doctor, a well of water and mail box. The shop to sell things needed by the tourists and in payment of the privilege and must keep the site clean of all trash etc. Twenty families have signed up for this plan. Mrs. Anding is a charter member of the state park Assn.

Miss Gladys Breazeale of Natchitoches brought a message from the convention of the 8th District as follows:

"It was moved and seconded and unanimously carried that the women of the convention go on record as pledging themselves to cut only the ~~xxxx~~ branches and not to disabuse the holly, red bud, and grandfathers grey beard trees.

Resolved:- that Miss Gladys Breazeale carry this message to the meeting of the Old Spanish Trail Convention in New Orleans.

Mrs. J. C. Myrick moved that Miss Clotilde Nagel be indorsed as a member of the Executive Board in recognition of her splendid work. Moved and seconded that this be tabled until later.

Miss Florence Huberwald of New Orleans Made the following motion: "That Louisiana being very proud of its oak trees that are evergreen, that the Parliament request that all Oak trees along the Spanish Trail be preserved and never destroyed.

Mrs. Prentiss of Welsh told of the section of highway near Welsh that there were no places to plant trees and asked suggestions as to how to beautify such parts of Highway.
